Island Literacy Network Writing Continuum

INTRODUCTION:

The Island Literacy Network is composed of a group of Vancouver Island Educators who meet approximately six times each school year to exchange ideas and fine tune their craft. We are pleased to share our most recent project; a writing continuum. We would also like to acknowledge the work done by the Aspen Park Elementary team of educators in the Comox Valley as we have built upon their work.

It is our hope that this continuum highlights the growth that occurs during the elementary years and serves as a useful assessment tool for students, teachers, and parents too.


PLEASE NOTE:

- 1. This writing continuum offers opportunities for consistent, collaborative, strength-based conversations between and among students, teachers and parents.
- 2. This continuum represents growth over time. The writing samples were collected from kindergarten to grade 7 students. Intentionally, it was not organized by traditional grade levels because writing is an ongoing, creative journey.
- 3. Two columns are offered showing the connection between B.C.'s performance standards and the 6+1 Traits of Writing (Culham & Spandel).
- 4. From sample 14 onwards, a sliding bar is offered as an, at-a-glance visual of relative strengths and next steps within longer pieces of text. This is not meant as a summative evaluation, rather as a quick reference. Because writing is an ongoing, creative journey, four bars represent current success and possibilities for continued growth.

APPENDIX:

- 1. A 6+1 Key Qualities chart is included. Descriptive feedback within this continuum is based on this chart.
- 2. Blank conference sheets are provided as a tool to continue conversations with and between students.
- 3. A class profile chart is also provided and offers teachers a guide for explicit teaching and the opportunity to notice trends and patterns within a group of students because every author has room to grow regardless of age.


